Dear Friends of the Library,

With this issue, I wish to review with you a recent study by the Arkansas Research Center, funded with a grant from the Arkansas Education Department titled "Education and Wage Outcomes for the Arkansas Workforce." We all know that it pays to educate oneself. But this study has interesting parameters and highly relevant specificity.

It is about Arkansas workers and their wages five years after formal schooling stopped. It is about workers who stopped education in 2006 and their wages during 2011.

Don't forget the economic conditions during this period. The economy was good in 2006 and Fayetteville shale fracking caused low unemployment and increased school dropout. Then the depression hit or was it the great recession?

The salient numbers. For those doing undergraduate work, an almost linear relationship exists between years of education attained and wages earned. And it is almost linear backward through high school drop outs. For example, a high school grad in 2006 made \$14,972 in the year 2011. A 2006 quitter in the 9<sup>th</sup> grade earned \$6,971 in 2011. This calculates to about \$2,666 additional wage per additional year of school.

This gradient is steeper for post high school education. After 1 year of college, a 2006 freshman earned \$21,057 in 2011. After 3 more years for a bachelor degree, a graduate in 2006 earned \$38,872 in 2011. This yields \$5900 additional wages for each year of education through a BA/BS.

And the gradient from BA/BS through Ph.D is greatest. There is a \$25,958 difference in wages in 2011. And any conscientious Ph.D. candidate without parental funding can surely graduate in 4 years. Twenty-six thousand divided by 4 yields a gradient of about \$6500 additional wages per year of additional education.

Note, these figures indicate little about the investment value in education.

Other numbers. Thirty-seven percent of Arkansas laborers have at best a high school diploma. Forty percent of workers with any undergraduate education have 1 year of college and twenty percent of this group have a bachelors degree. Less than 8 percent of Arkansas workers have post graduate education.

# 2013 Book Sales Results

Our annual spring and fall sales remain our most important sources of income. The 2013 Spring Sale resulted in a total income of \$4,482.74 which included 60 new or renewed memberships. 58 volunteers provided 284 hours of labor to insure this success. A special thanks goes out to George Cline and his crew: Mike Murphy, Chuck Speice, Barry Posterick, Steve Christ and Caiden Barron. These men provided the muscle to set up tables, brought books from our storage building and saw that the library was returned to good order when the sale concluded. And, of course, it was the donations of books from our patrons that helped make it possible. Thanks to you all.

Eager young children, accompanied by their mothers, were lined up long before the library opened at 9:00 to attend the Children's Sale the first day of June. Our goal was to provide books for summer reading for entertainment and to maintain reading skills over the summer. There were over 20 boxes of select books donated especially for this sale - about 1000 books were sold. And although income is not the primary reason for this sale, FOL earned over \$319. Volunteers provided 60.5 hours of labor.
