FALL BOOK SALE

COMING TO YOUR LIBRARY: A NEW ELEVATOR!

We have crossed our fingers and held our collective breaths but sometimes you just have to face the facts. Our elevator is too old to be repaired. In fact, it's so old that when parts have to be replaced, those parts have to be specially made because standard parts are no longer being manufactured. As much as we love the mid-century feel of the building, sometimes an upgrade is required.

The two-story building has served us well. We love the mezzanine area and the separate children's and genealogy departments. But without an elevator, it's very difficult to move carts of books from one floor to the next. Parents pushing baby strollers can't navigate the stairs and many of our senior citizens need the elevator. We also are required by law and want to meet the needs of patrons who are impacted by the Americans with Disabilities Act.

The Boone County Library Administrative Board met on July 22 and made the decision to replace rather than repair the aging elevator. Much research was done and thoughtful discussion was held before a vote was taken. Repairs to fix the current issues with the elevator came with a price tag of approximately \$30,000. And of course, as time goes on, there will be future issues with the old elevator. To replace the old elevator will cost \$70,000 to \$80,000. The decision to spend this large amount of the library's savings of donated funds was not taken lightly. We feel replacement of the elevator will be money will spent.

The goal of the library is to provide a safe environment for all our patrons. We hope our patrons will be understanding of any inconvenience the transition will cause. Please keep the library in mind with your annual giving. Donations to replenish these savings would be greatly appreciated.

It has been a long time since I have communicated with you. We skipped May-June and July-August issues of the Bookplate on frugality grounds. Let us catch up.

We had a great **Spring Book Sale** back in April. The sale netted \$4,573.58 of which \$380 were memberships and \$100 were donations. About two thirds of the revenue from book sales was from individually priced books.

And of course we have continuous sales - the Silent Auction and the fixed price Trolley Sale. The next big sale is the **Fall Book Sale** on October 1, 2, and 3. Details of this sale are discussed elsewhere herein.

The **Summer Reading Program** at the library started the last part of June with 263 registrants. The theme was "Every Hero Has a Story." FOL was heavily involved in funding this children's summer program. A few details are elsewhere in this newsletter - look for the fire truck.

The **Children's Book Sale**, June 6, was another success. Many, many parents and children left with sacks of summer books. Very few books cost more than a quarter. FOL's objective with this sale is to put books in the hands of young readers, rather than making money to fund other projects.

The **library elevator** has been on its last leg for several years. This summer, it stumbled with some children onboard. All survived with only a fright. But one cannot cater to children and have a frightful circumstance at the ready, unless the children have reached that age when frightfully memorable events become excitingly memorable events. It was decided to replace the elevator. Obtaining parts was problematic and was cost prohibitive, and labor costs were heart stopping. FOL is again involved with helping replace dilapidated systems. We have made a promise to help finance the elevator. See elsewhere in this newsletter the Boone County Library notice of replacement.

FOL has a few unusual donations. We have a Nordic Track Pro wood and steel ski exerciser with workout computer. We have an entertainment cabinet and other furniture, and we have a box of old sewing patterns. These items will be offered at our Fall Book Sale - October 1, 2, & 3.

Also unusual, to be offered at the **Holiday Sale** in December, is a large selection of Rockwell Saturday Evening Post cover pages.

This brings us up to date. Hope to see you at the Fall Book Sale, October 1, 2, & 3.

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

Books Go to Preschool

School has begun and FOL has shifted into high gear on one of our projects. At the beginning of school each year, FOL stocks all ABC and Head Start preschool classrooms with mini libraries of 25 books. These books are replaced monthly to provide a fresh supply of reading materials for both teachers and students. The students can check out the books the old fashioned way by signing a card associated with each book and leaving the card with the teacher. The teachers and the tots very much appreciate this program. FOL owns the books and are totally responsible for placement, replacement and maintenance. FOL owns nearly 600 books and about 500 are in the field during the school year. The monthly refreshing of the books provides about 200 different titles per year for each classroom. We choose new books with consultation of the Boone County Library staff. The new books are purchased with donations, both private and corporate, and from FOL funds. At this time, funding is mainly with grants from Fed Ex and the Walton Family Foundation. All involved consider this a worthy program.

Book Ends by Sally Robinson

A woman in Arkansas prowls the cemeteries. All year long. And she sees dead people. And their families. And their ancestors. Her name is Abby Boewe Burnett. She loves cemeteries and exploring headstones. She once wanted to be an archaeologist, but took a detour through the cemeteries and the history of Arkansas. She took notes and kept journals. Her stack of notes, journals and published articles grew to be quite large. The natural progression to a manuscript was realized in October, 2014, with the publication by University Press of Mississippi of her book, Gone to the Grave: Burial Customs of the Arkansas Ozarks, 1850-1950.

On August 25, the Boone County Library, as part of its Buffalo National River Program, had Abby as a guest speaker. It was an excellent program, and her enthusiasm was quite evident as was that of her audience. If you were not able to be there, never fear. On Thursday, September 17, Friends of the Library Boone County has scheduled her to a donot-miss encore, complete with book sales and book signing. Put the date on your calendar.

While you have your calendar out, also mark October 1, 2, and 3. This is the time for the annual fall, over-the-top book sale. It will be held at the library and will include many new and gently used fiction, non-fiction, and collectable books at bargain prices. Members will have an exclusive preview sale on Thursday morning with the sale opening to the general public in the afternoon and on Friday and Saturday. A list of some of the display books will be published in the September 26 Book Ends article and will also be in the display case at the library for two weeks before the sale. Also in that article, for the first time, the FOL book sleuths will be giving their recommendations on the books for sale.

While visiting my mother who is presently homebound, I was reminded of one of FOL's valuable services, the homebound library delivery program. If you or someone you know loves to read but is unable to make it to the library, contact George Cline at 870-741-7121. He will visit, interview, determine what type of books you like, and, if you qualify, will deliver books to your home on a regular basis. This is one of the programs the Friends of the Library, a completely volunteer organization, offers.
